New phase of Bond work complete as students and staff return to class

Bond work continued throughout the district this summer, with several buildings receiving exterior, interior, classroom, plumbing, electrical, and technology upgrades.

Elementary schools including Angus, Harwood, Holden, Jefferson, Willow Woods, Wilkerson, and the district's four middle and three high schools all received upgrades during the summer construction shift.

The improvements were made possible through a \$134.5 million bond proposal, which was approved by voters in May 2016, to preserve the district's facilities and remain com-





petitive as one of Macomb County's leading school districts.

Work at the elementary level included replacing building interior and exterior doors and hardware, upgrading restroom sinks, toilets, flooring and faucets, new media center flooring, replacing classroom flooring, casework, and upgrading window treatments, replacing classroom sinks, building drinking fountains, and adding water bottle filling stations.

Work at the middle schools included modifying parking to improve traffic flow, improving site drainage, upgrading parking lot lighting, replacing the sinks, toilets, flooring, and faucets in the restrooms, replacing the flooring in the media center, office, and band rooms, renovating the home economics room and shop area, refinishing gym floors, replacing stage curtains, replacing drinking fountains and adding water bottle filling stations, replacing boilers, and upgrading the existing fire alarm system.

Upgrades at Cousino High School included the replacement of parking lot asphalt in selected areas, modifi-

cations to the south parking lot to improve bus drop off, and a refinished main gymnasium floor.

At Sterling Heights High School site work such as replacing parking lot drives and modifying parking to improve traffic flow are a few upgrades that took place over the past few months. Other upgrades include replacing select doors and hardware inside the building, replacing the flooring in the media center and refinishing the gymnasium floor. The swimming pool filtration system, boiler, pipes, valves and temperature controls were replaced and upgraded.



Class of 2018: Celebrating Dynamic Futures

More than 1,000 graduates received diplomas from the district's four high schools during commencement exercises at Macomb Community College and the WCS Performing Arts Center in June.

The Class of 2018 included 81 students from Community High School, 304 from Cousino High School, 307 students from Sterling Heights High School, and 358 students from Warren Mott High School.

The Class of 2018 was awarded \$18,465,890 in academic and athletic scholarships.

"The number of scholarships earned by our students confirms for me that we have hardworking students, supportive families, and outstanding teachers and support staff," Superintendent of Schools Robert D. Livernois, Ph.D. said. "I couldn't be more proud of our district and look forward to the many future achievements of our graduates."

BOND REFUNDING

During the last fiscal year, the District advance refunded 2007 outstanding bonds that were scheduled to mature between 2002 and 2027 and had a true interest cost of 4 percent. These were replaced with the issuance of 2017 Refunding Bonds that also mature between 2022 and 2027 and have a true interest cost of 2.24 percent. Over the life of the bonds this will save the taxpayers of the district more than \$900,000.

Student-built home sells for \$292,000 in Troy



Warren Consolidated Schools recently sold its student-built home for more than \$17,000 over listing price, after being on the market for two days.

The home, located on Locksley Court in the city of Troy, was built by the students in the Building Trades program at the Career Preparation Center.

Majority of the home was constructed by senior Building Trades II students, except for the foundation, roofing, and outdoor brickwork, which was contracted by skilled trades representatives.

The home boasts 1,723 square feet of living space and includes a spacious kitchen and nook, great room with vaulted ceiling, three bedrooms, two full bathrooms and a first-floor laundry. The home also includes a 1,600 square foot finished basement with living area, storage, a full-size bathroom, bedroom, and egress window.



High end materials such as granite countertops were installed throughout the home.

The project, which began in 2010, was completed in June of 2018. Students worked on the home one hour a day, four days a week. This year's Building Trades class was made up of 15 students, an instructor, and building trades assistant.

"Warren Consolidated Schools is proud to be part of the State's skilled trades career shortage solution by offering CTE programs such as building trades to our students," Superintendent of Schools Superintendent Robert D. Livernois, Ph.D. said.

Due to a shortage of skilled trades careers in Michigan, Governor Snyder announced the Marshall Plan for Talent in June, funneling \$100 million this fall into Michigan's public high schools to train students for high-demand jobs over the next five years.

The Marshall Plan seeks to fill gaps in the talent pool and prepare students for future job growth by restructuring the education system to favor a new method of learning that encourages certificate-based education. Instead of relying solely on the four-year college model that does not always translate directly to high-paying careers, the Marshall Plan aims to favor more gradual, step-by-step learning that will encourage students to learn throughout their lives.

"It is nice to see the State of Michigan finally recognizing the need to support CTE programs, the way WCS has been doing for more than 20 years at its Career Preparation Center," Livernois said.

In addition to Building Trades, WCS offers a full range of skilled trade courses such as Collision Repair, Culinary Arts, Dental Science, Health Science, Metal Technology, Visual Imaging & Printing Technology, Robotics, Radio-Television, Web Design, plus much more.

Warren Mott High School students and visitors will notice an upgraded athletic field entrance and new walkway to the west side of the football stadium. Other upgrades at Mott include refinishing the gymnasium floor, the construction of a new concession stand, and upgraded exterior lighting in select areas of the building.

Technology upgrades throughout the district at all grade levels included upgrading classroom instructional technology, replacing computers and upgrading the Audio/Video systems. Secure entry equipment and new security cameras were added throughout the district.

The total cost for the 2018 work was \$37,296,000.

The second shift of construction work at Black, Cromie, Green Acres, Lean, Siersma, and Susick Elementary Schools is slated for Summer 2019.



The gymnasiums at Cousino, Sterling Heights, and Warren Mott were recently refinished during the summer bond work. Additional work is expected to take place in the summer 2019.

Annual Notices

Integrated Pest Management (IPM)

The State of Michigan law requires that schools that may apply pesticides on school property must provide an annual advisory to parents or guardians of students attending a facility.

Please be advised that Warren Consolidated Schools utilizes an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach to control pests. IPM is a pest management system that utilizes all suitable techniques in a total pest management system with the intent of preventing pests from reaching unacceptable levels or to reduce an existing population to an acceptable level. Pest management techniques emphasize sanitation, pest exclusion and biological controls. One of the objectives of using an IPM approach is to reduce or eliminate the need for chemical applications of pesticides. However, certain situations may require the need for pesticides to be utilized.

As required by State of Michigan law, you will receive advance notice regarding the non-emergency application of a pesticide such as an insecticide, fungicide or herbicide, other than a bait or gel formulation. That is made to the school grounds or buildings during the school year. Please note that notification is not given for the infestation of stinging insects, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students, but you will be notified following any such application.

Advance notification of pesticide applications, other than a bait or gel formulation, will be given by at least two methods. The first method will be by posting at the main entrance to the school. The second method will be posting at the school's main office.

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school are entitled to receive the advance notice of a pesticide application, other than a bait or gel formulation, by first class United States mail postmarked at least three days before the pesticide application, if they so request. If you prefer to receive the notification by first class mail, contact Kenneth Matheny at Elite Pest Management who is contracted and responsible for all inspections and pesticide procedures. Elite Pest Management can be reached at 586-294-7055. Forms are also available in the main offices of each school.

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school may review the school's Integrated Pest Management program and records of any pesticide application, upon request.

Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response ACT

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires that each year district workers and building occupants receive notification about asbestos activities such as response actions and inspections. The purpose of this correspondence is to meet those requirements and familiarize you with the asbestos related activities that have been conducted in Warren Consolidated Schools this past year.

Management Plans—In 1998, Warren Consolidated Schools contracted with Asbestos Management Inc. to conduct inspections for asbestos containing material with all district owned buildings. This information was then compiled into Asbestos Management Plans. These Management Plans are kept in each building and are available for review. A copy of each building management plan is also located in the Educational Service Center.

Surveillance Activities—The AHERA regulation requires surveillance of the condition of AMC every six months and re-inspections every three years. The periodic surveillance was conducted in September 2014. Since the last re-inspection was done in 2016, the next three years re-inspection will be conducted in 2019. Both of these surveillance activities will be included as part of the buildings' Management Plans.

Asbestos Abatement—It is anticipated that Warren Consolidated Schools will need to conduct asbestos abatement within its facilities over the next year removing materials such as, but not limited to, floor tile, floor tile mastic, fire doors and fire door frames. All remaining ACM will continue to be maintained under the Operations and Maintenance Program.

Any removal projects will be performed by a Michigan Licensed Asbestos Abatement Contractor and managed by Nova Environmental, Inc., the District's environmental consulting firm.
