## **Camp Description:**

If you haven't already, you will create and link your College Board student account to your Khan Academy account. The advantage of linking accounts is Khan Academy will use your previous test scores, like the spring 2017 PSAT 10, to create a tailored practice plan. The camp will provide the space, technology and a quiet atmosphere for students to work on their tailored plan. Students will complete about 7 hours of their plan while having fun "brain breaks" in between.

Parents of registered Macomb county students will have the opportunity to attend an informational evening meeting on Thursday night during the week of the camp. The meeting will included an overview of the state required 11<sup>th</sup> grade SAT test, how to monitor your student's progress in Khan Academy, and how to support your student beyond the camp. Students are welcome to attend with their parents.
